WILLIAM RICHARD WILLIAMS, FORMER RESIDENT OF FALLS, PASSES AWAY.

When the sad news of the death of William R. Williams was received at the Falls last week there was a general expression of profound sorrow. Having resided here for nearly forty years, he had endeared himself to many of the people by his kindly disposition and friendly actions. Few men have the happy qualities he possessed in winning and retaining friends.

Mr. Williams breathed his last on September 14, after being confined to his bed for ten days, suffering from general debility. He was a son of Richard Williams and was born in Anglesea, Wales, August 17, 1834. He came to this country in 1858, and for several years had charge of the garden and greenhouse of George L. Harrison, on School lane. Later he leased the homestead farm of the late Dr. Horace Evans, on which he devoted himself to the dairy business and in the breeding of Jersey cattle. He also had charge of the registering of Jersey cows for a number of wealthy farmers in different parts of Eastern Pennsylvania, including George W. Childs, proprietor of the Public Ledger, at his country seat in Bryn Mawr. The taking of a large portion of the Evans farm as part of the site for the Queen lane reservoir practically ruined his dairy farming, and a few years later he retired with a well-earned and deserved competency. For a while he resided in the home of Harry Schock, on Abbotsford avenue, and later removed to Germantown, where he quietly passed the remainder of his days. The last five years of his active and useful life were years of darkness, as he was afflicted with blindness, which resulted from the weakening of the optic nerves. In his early manhood Mr. Williams was married to Miss Emma Bradford, who, with their four children, survive—Benjamin and Horace E. Williams, Mrs. Annie Allen, a widow, and Miss Nettie Williams.

Mr. Williams was for a time a member of the Baptist Church here, removing his membership to Wayne Avenue Church, Germantown. He was an enthusiastic member of St. David's Society and other Welsh organizations. He inherited his nation's love for music, and was a singer of rare ability. He was also a member of Palestine Lodge, No. 470, F. and A. M., and of Falls of Schuylkill Lodge, No. 467, I. O. O. F.

The funeral was held last Friday morning at 11 o'clock in the parlor of Oliver P. Bair, 1820 Chestnut street. The services were conducted by the

Mrs. Susan Crompton, whose death was caused by debility, and whose funeral took place from her late residence, 159 Queen lane, on Tuesday of last week, was buried in Mount Vernon Cemetery after services in the Church of St. James the Less, of which she was a member.

J.; Thomas Crompton, the successful Queen Lane grocer; James Crompton, of Cresson street, and Mrs. Mary A. Hamilton, wife of George Hamilton, who resides at the old homestead, on Queen lane. Deceased also leaves eleven grandchildren. She was a communicant at the church of St. James the Less for over 50 years.

WATERS GIVE UP THEIR DEAD.

Finding of the Body of Miss Drennan in Delaware Bay.

Her Body Laid to Rest Quietly in Laurel Hill Cemetery.

After months of sleepless anxiety, and fearing the worst, the tortured minds of the family of Miss Martha Drennan, who disappeared from her home on Ridge avenue, November 29, have at last the consolation of having the body of the unfortunate young woman returned to them for Christian burial.

The distressing circumstances surrounding her death is particularly sad, she and her family being among the most highly esteemed residents of this vicinity. She was always of a quiet retiring disposition, and very religiously inclined. For some time past she has been suffering from nervous prostration, and on the Sunday morning when she was discovered to have gone out, the family at once became greatly alarmed, and not finding her at the home of any relative, notified the police authorities, and searching parties scoured the surrounding country, but without avail. The only trace after she left home was secured from Patrick O'Brien, Sr., of Allegheny avenue, who saw her ascending the steps of Laurel Hill station, on that morning at 7.30 A. M.; Park Guard Coulter stationed on the East Park drive at the stone bridge, saw her a few minutes afterwards coming through Laurel Hill Cemetery, and as she reached the Park drive and passed him, he spoke to her. Thinking it strange that she should be taking a walk so early in the morning, he watched her until she disappeared over the brow of the hill at the Calumet street bridge, back of Grace Chapel Church. This was the last seen of her until her headless body was found in Delaware bay, near Bridgeton, N. J., last Thursday, by a fisherman, her body being carried along by a cuke of ice, to which one of her feet had been frozen.

Relatives reading of the finding of the body were so impressed with the description of the clothing comparing so closely with that worn by Miss Drennan on the morning of her disappearance that on Friday morning Michael Drennan, a brother, and her aunt, Mrs. Martha Burns, visited Bridgeton and recognized the body.

Undertaker Moore, of Philadelphia, an old friend of the family, took charge of the remains and brought it to the home of the bereaved family at 3937 Ridge avenue on Sunday evening, and on Monday morning, after Solemn Requiem Mass at St. Bridget's Church, the remains were quietly laid to rest

LIVED IN "TOM" MOORE'S COTTAGE

Anna L. Garret-Marley Dead at the Home of Her Daughter on North Thirty-second Street.

The "good woman in Tom Moore's cottage" died of paralysis on Monday night at the home of her daughter, 2147 North Thirty-second street.

For thirty-five years, from 1832 to 1867, Anna L. Garret-Marley lived in what is known as "Tom Moore's cottage," in West Park. The cottage derives its name from the fact that the English poet, Moore, lived in it when he was in this city.

During the time of Mrs. Marley's occupancy of the historic place, the Reading Railway had two tracks along the west bank of the Schuylkill River, and whenever a storm of any kind would block the trains in that vicinity Mrs. Marley gave the railroad men shelter and food and cared for them when they were sick from exposure. In this way she earned the name which has clung to her ever since.

After Mrs. Marley left the erstwhile abode of Moore she went to Belmont Glen cottage at the foot of Belmont Glen by the Reading Railway. From here she moved to her daughter's house in the Falls of Schuylkill.

Mrs. Marley was 60 years of age and was much beloved by the many railroad men who had known her in years past when she ministered to them in trouble. She was also much respected through the Falls of Schuylkill, where her skill as a nurse for children was much in demand. Her funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon and will be attended by old railroad men from all over this part of the country.

DEATH OF EDWARD M. McILVAINE.

Dies in the German Hospital Following an Operation for Appendicitis.

The funeral of Edward M. McIlvaine, the well-known confectioner and caterer, of Ridge avenue, who died in the German Hospital on last Saturday morning following an operation for appendicitis at that institution the previous Monday, took place yesterday morning from his late home, 4251 Ridge avenue. Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated at St. Bridget's Church, after which interment was made in St. John's Cemetery, Manayunk.

The untimely death of deceased has attracted universal sympathy for his bereaved wife and relatives. Though but a young man, through indefatigable energy he had built up a successful business as confectioner and caterer. Particularly sad is his being cut off in the prime of life from his wife and three little children, the oldest of whom is but three years of age, the other two being twins, but fifteen months old.

He was of an affable, sunshiny disposition and made many friends, whose evidence of grief was shown in the numerous beautiful floral designs surrounding his bier. His funeral was largely attended. He was a brother to Undertaker Charles H. McIlvaine, and through courtesy of local undertakers Charles L. Dykes and Mr. W. Hess, assisted Undertaker Moore, a friend of the family from Conshohocken, in taking charge of the obsequies.

JAMES FERGUSON HOPE

Ex-President of the Union League

Whose boyhood days were spent at the Falls of Schuylkill, and who like many others who once attended the Forest School became prominent in commercial, financial and other circles, died suddenly on Sunday morning, at his home, 3905 Chestnut street, of heart disease. When he arose in the morning he was apparently in the best of health. He had shaved himself and was dressing when stricken with the fatal attack and fell lifeless on the floor. Mrs. Hope, who was in another room, heard the fall and hurrying to the room found her husband lying on the floor. She telephoned to Dr. William E. Hughes, of Fortieth and Chestnut streets, who pronounced his death to have been instantaneous, of heart disease.

Mr. Hope was born in Alexandria, Scotland, September 26, 1843, and was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hope, who brought him to this country in 1847 and soon after came to the Falls. The father was a print block cutter, and for a number of years was employed in Simpson's silk handkerchief print works. He was a most exemplary citizen and helped to found Falls of Schuylkill Presbyterian Church, of which he was one of the first elders. The family resided on James, now Stanton, street. The three sons, James F., John and Alexander, with their sister, Jeanette, attended the Forest School while the late Robert Mackie was the principal. James was a manly youth and won the admiration of all with whom he came in contact. At the time of the semi-centennial of the occupancy of the Forest School site, held in 1901, he was present and greatly enjoyed the exercises.

In 1861 he entered the oil cloth factory of Thomas Potter and he has continued his connection with that concern ever since, rising from one position to another, until he became secretary and treasurer of Thomas Potter Sons & Co.

In 1864, when the Union League was organizing provisional regiments to fight the battles of the Union in the last few days of the Civil War, Mr. Hope enlisted as corporal of Company F, One Hundred and Ninety-sixth Pennsylvania Volunteers. He served in the army only three months, returning to his business.

He was elected to membership in the Union League in 1890 and five years later became a member of the committee on membership. In the next year he was made a director and in 1902 he was elected vice president, being re-elected in 1903 and 1904. In 1908 he was elected president and served for three terms. It was during his incumbency that the league's handsome new building fronting on Fifteenth street was begun and the centenary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln so elaborately celebrated by the league.

During his long business career, Mr. Hope branched out into many other industries besides the Potter business. He became a director of the Philadel-

phia National Bank, a trustee of the Penn Mutual Life Insurance Company, a director of the American Audit and Appraisal Company and other corporations. He was at one time president of the St. Andrew's Society, a manager of the Home Missionary Society and a member of Meade Post, No. 1, G. A. R. FORMER PRINCIPAL OF FOREST SCHOOL DIES OF HEART DISEASE

Was Head of Philadelphia Girls' Normal School

James Monroe Willard, principal of the Girls' Normal School and a former principal of Forrest School, died suddenly from heart disease on July 3rd, at his home, 351 East Chelton avenue, Germantown. He had apparently been in good health up to the time of his death. A daughter survives him.

Doctor Willard was one of the leading educators in the public school system of the city. He was a former president of the teachers' Association and identified with a number of other educational organizations.

Born in Northampton, Bucks county, in 1848, he completed his education at Central High School in this city. He taught school in the country districts immediately following his graduation and returned to Philadelphia to take charge of the Washington School in Frankford in 1866.

Later he taught successively in the Randolph School, at Nicetown; the Forrest School, at Falls of Schuylkill, and the Germantown Grammar School. In 1896 he was made principal of the present Northeast High School. Two years later he was chosen from a number of prominent educators to be principal of the Normal School, following the resignation of George H. Cliff.

Doctor Willard was the originator of a number of reforms in the grading of the work of pupils in the schools, departing from the old methods of arbitrarily reducing scholastic averages by demerits.

Joseph Johnson

Oldest Resident of the Falls of Schuylkill
Dies Shortly Before His 97th Birthday

The sad news of the passing away of Joseph Johnson last Friday at his home, 4500 Ridge avenue, was sorrowfully received by the entire community, in which he had been the oldest resident. His many friends were preparing to congratulate him on his ninety-seventh birthday anniversary, which would have occurred on Saturday, January 24. He had been in ill-health for some weeks, but seemed to be improving when a sudden change came, and he passed peacefully away in the presence of his family, retaining consciousness until near the end.

Mr. Johnson was one of twelve children of Jacob and Elizabeth Fox Johnson, and was born January 24, 1817, on his father's farm, on the west side of the Schuylkill, adjoining the estate of Judge Peters, now known as Belmont Mansion, Fairmount Park. The plantation had a frontage of more than a mile along the river, and extended back to Ford road. His early life was spent on the farm. Having an inclination for mechanics, he learned to be a mechanical draughtsman, and became an expert forger of keen-edged tools and instruments used for surgical and scientific purposes. He invented a number of important instruments, but never took out any patents. Mr. Johnson for a number of years had charge of the machine business in Dobson's mills and in the Midvale Steel Works, and for a time carried on blacksmithing in the rear of his home. In 1865 he became a member of Falls of Schuylkill Baptist Church, while the Rev. John Enoch Chesshire was pastor. **Reading Conductor
Struck By Bridge**

**David J. Grill Was Long
In Railroad's Service**

David J. Grill, 57 years old, of 3572 Queen lane, conductor of Engine 957 and one of the oldest "railroaders" of the Philadelphia & Reading Railway, died Monday afternoon about quarter past three o'clock in St. Timothy's Hospital from a fractured skull, which he received when struck by an overhead bridge while riding on the tender of the locomotive between Nicetown lane and Laurel Hill Station, along the Port Richmond Branch. The accident occurred a little before noon.

It is said that he was returning to the West Falls yards with his engine "running light" when he saw the lid of the water tank open and while closing it he received his fatal injury. The man had a narrow escape from death several years ago.

The crew did not know that their conductor had met with an accident, as he was found lying unconscious in the coal pit of the tender by the fireman. A quick run was made to Laurel Hill Station and a passing automobile was pressed into service to remove the unconscious man to St. Timothy's Hospital, where he died without regaining consciousness.

His funeral will take place tomorrow morning, at 8 o'clock, from his late home on Queen lane. Solemn Requiem Mass will be celebrated at St. Bridget's Church. The interment will be made at Westminster Cemetery.

Mr. Grill was born at Reading. When 18 years old he came to the Falls, where he was married to Miss Elizabeth Frisch by the Rev. W. Walsh, then pastor of St. Bridget's Church, on August 19, 1880. A few weeks ago the Grills celebrated their thirty-fifth wedding anniversary.

He had been employed with the Reading Railway for over 38 years, having begun as brakeman. For nine years he was yard master and for a time was stationed at Wayne Junction. He was offered the position of engineer several times, but refused, preferring to be in the train, conducting service. A son, Harry J. Grill, is engineer in the New York-Philadelphia express service of the Reading.

Found Dead in Gas-Filled Room

J. MacKay of Ridge Ave. Heart Trouble Sufferer

John MacKay, 45 years old, of 4167 Ridge avenue, was found dead in bed Sunday evening about 6.30 o'clock, asphyxiated by illuminating gas. Nearby were Sunday newspapers, which the man probably had been reading just before his death, and a half-smoked cigar, which had dropped from his hand.

As to how the man came to his death, several physicians have expressed the theory that while seized with a severe attack of heart affection, with which the man had been afflicted, he met his death.

The man had always been known for his quiet disposition and methodical living and his death shocked many.

His sister, Miss Isabelle MacKay, who had gone to Manasquan, N. J., early Sunday morning, was completely prostrated when she heard of the death of her brother, who had made the home for her.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late home on Ridge avenue, the Rev. A. Percival Hodgson, pastor of Falls Methodist Episcopal Church, officiating at the ceremonies. The interment was made with Masonic rites at Ivy Hill Cemetery.

Mr. MacKay was born of Scotch parentage at Mt. Alry, Germantown, about 45 years ago. When about one year old his parents brought him to the Falls, where the father, Hugh MacKay, found employment at the Dobson mills. Struck On Head In Fight, Man Dies

James Byrne Hurt Re- sisting Arrest by Officer

James Byrne, whose name the police at first gave as Burns, 57 years old, of 4030 Ridge avenue, who was badly beaten by Officer Dorsey Saturday a week ago, while resisting arrest, died Monday morning at the Philadelphia Hospital, where he was taken after derangement of the mind had developed.

In the belief that the death of Byrne had resulted from a blood clot formed on his brain by a blow received during the fight with Policeman Dorsey, a post-mortem examination was made, the results of which were temporarily withheld by the hospital physicians.

On Saturday, November 20, Byrne became involved in a street fight on Ridge avenue near his home. Policeman Dorsey separated Byrne from the man he was fighting, and in a rage at this interference Byrne attacked the policeman with a brick. In defending himself Dorsey threw the man to the street, Byrne striking his head on the curb, although not violently. He suffered a slight laceration of the scalp, and was taken to St. Timothy's Hospital.

Several days later Byrne began to act queerly, and his neighbors became alarmed. On Tuesday, November 23, he forced an entrance into the house at 178 Stanton street, a property owned by the estate of his deceased father, Thomas Byrne. On being placed under arrest he told the police he was sick and complained of severe pains in his head. His examination and commitment to the Philadelphia Hospital followed.

By persons who seem to know a declaration was made that Byrne had been arrested by Officer Dorsey five or six years ago, which Byrne had never forgotten. On several occasions he had expressed a desire for revenge upon the policeman, and even threatened Dorsey personally, saying that he would "get him" or "get even." Whatever truth there may be in this cannot be said.

It was also added that ordinarily Byrne was a man of quiet and unobtrusive habits, but when he had been drinking he displayed fits of temper. When in an intoxicated condition he had revealed his hatred for the policeman who had previously arrested him.

The funeral of the deceased took place this morning from the residence of his son, Thomas G. Byrne, of 3225 North Stillman street, near Twenty-seventh street and Allegheny avenue. A requiem service was held in St. Bridget's Church. The interment was made at St. John's Cemetery, Manayunk.

The pallbearers were her six sons, Edward G. Smith, Bowman street; James S., Twelfth street and Glenwood avenue, Philadelphia; Thomas, Calumet street; John C., Roxborough; Alonzo P., West Philadelphia, and Robert R. Smith, of Germantown. Thus was gratified a wish Mrs. Smith had always expressed.

Mrs. Smith was born in County Wicklow, Ireland, in the beautiful vale of Avoca, considered by many the most beautiful spot in the world. Her father's farm adjoined the farm of the father of the young man who became her husband. Her maiden name was Elizabeth Sutton.

In 1851 Mr. and Mrs. John Smith started for the United States from Liverpool in a ship which was wrecked when five hundred miles from the American shore. They had terrible experiences until a rescue ship, which was an ocean tramp, picked them and others up and carried them back to Liverpool, the destination of the vessel. Half an hour after the saved were off the sinking ship it was swallowed by the waves, with the property effects of the rescued. The Smiths started for America a second time and arrived on this continent sixteen weeks after they first set sail. This story was often repeated in greater detail by Mrs. Smith.

For a time the Smiths lived at Nicetown lane, where the husband followed the occupation of landscape gardener. In 1859 they moved to the Falls and Mr. Smith entered the employ of Powers and Weightman and in 1873, during the first term of Mayor Stokley, he was appointed on the police force and served twenty-two years as a trusted employe of that bureau. He died in 1896.

Four years ago Mrs. Smith had her left foot badly hurt while getting off a Midvale avenue car at Ridge avenue. The injured member never fully recovered.

Mrs. Smith will be remembered in the 70s and 80s for her great help and services to the sick and families in trouble.

She was a communicant at the Church of St. James the Less for the last sixty-five years.

Mrs. Smith is survived by six sons and two daughters, eleven grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

Thomas Seddon, Sr., chief of the High Pressure Fire Station at Second and Race streets, Philadelphia, died early Sunday morning at his home at 3221 Cresson street after suffering for more than three weeks with pneumonia, which resulted from a cold he contracted while out one evening on an automobile ride. He was 65 years of age.

Mr. Seddon was a native of Yorkshire, England. He was fourteen years of age when his parents brought him to this country and settled at Chester, Pennsylvania. He was given charge of the High Pressure Fire Station at Second and Race streets, Philadelphia, after its completion about twelve years ago, and this position he held at the time of his death.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN AND FORMER POLICEMAN PASSES AWAY

Fergus Peel, aged 75 years, a veteran of the Civil War and a former policeman of the local station, passed to his eternal home last Friday morning, December 1, at the home of his son-in-law, George R. Hassard, 4012 North Twelfth street, Philadelphia, of paralysis, after a lingering illness. Mr. Peel was a son of the late Robert Peel and was born in Huddersfield, England, October 3, 1841, and when 18 months old was brought to this country by his parents. The father was a block printer and came here to work in Simpson's silk handkerchief print works. The family resided many years in the little stone dwelling near the west end of the Falls bridge. Fergus and his brother Washington fitted up an athletic park on the site now occupied by the Montrose Boat Club house, and there taught their boy friends boxing and other stunts, at which the brothers were experts. Fergus at one time was offered large pay to train pugilists for the prize ring but declined the offer. He and his brother were also skilled in rowing. In his youth Fergus learned the business of a butcher, which he carried on until the breaking out of the Civil War, when he enlisted in the Union army and served four years, most of which was in the Third Pennsylvania Cavalry. His father and brother Washington enlisted in the Mozart New York Regiment Infantry, in which Washington was for heroic conduct promoted to a lieutenant. He died of wounds received in battle. After the war Fergus resumed the butcher business, and in 1872 was appointed to the police force by Mayor Stokley and was assigned to the Twenty-second District, where he served until the Thirty-ninth District was established, when he was transferred to the local station. He resigned a few years ago and went on the pension roll.

In his early manhood Mr. Peel married Miss Elizabeth Harper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Harper, of West Falls. Mrs. Peel passed away in June, 1913, at their home in Tioga. Veteran Of Sixties Claimed By Death

John M. Delaney Had Great Experiences In Civil War

John M., popularly known as "Jack" Delaney, who served considerable time in Uncle Sam's army and navy when a young man, died Monday evening of heart failure at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Anne Golden, 3612 North Thirty-fifth street. He had been ailing about a week.

His funeral will take place tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock. High Requiem Mass will be celebrated in St. Bridget's Church. The interment will be made at St. Mary's Cemetery, Roxborough.

His daughter and three grandchildren survive.

He was born aboard the vessel carrying his parents, who were of Irish ancestry, to America. His father found employment in the coal fields near Minersville, Schuylkill county, Penna., where the family lived for a number of years.

At the outbreak of the Civil War young John Delaney, who was still in his boyhood, enlisted in Company G, Sixty-eighth Pennsylvania Volunteers, and remained in the army until the close of the conflict.

He was in the front line of some of the more important battles of the War of the Rebellion. The second finger of his right hand was shot off by an enemy bullet in one of the fights and at Petersburg he was one of four volunteers to relight a fuse of a mine in the face of the foe's attacks. At Vicksburg he was made a captive, but after a short imprisonment made good his escape. He is recorded as having been in thirty-two battles.

After the struggle he enlisted in the United States navy and was with Farragut on the European cruise. In 1869, when his navy service had expired, he went for a second enlistment for naval duty for four more years.

In every case he received honorable discharge from the United States military and naval services.

Having ended his career in the service of the national defense he returned to Minersville, where he was wed to Miss Elizabeth Walsh. Later he and his family came to the Falls,

which was over twenty-five years ago.

Mr. Delaney was an interesting story teller and many heard his anecdotes of the contest between the North and the South. He was deeply impressed whenever the military airs to which he had marched were played. He had a great fondness for Irish entertainments.

He was a member of S. K. N. Patton Post, No 26, Grand Army of the Republic.

**Father Shoots Son

"Clarence Park, 38 years, 3500 West Allegheny avenue, shot Tuesday night (October 15) during a quarrel, died last night (Thursday, October 17), in the Samaritan Hospital.

"Hugh Park, 62 years, 4116 Ridge avenue, father of the dead man, who, according to the police, has confessed to firing the shot, will likely be given a hearing within a few days. He was arrested shortly after the shooting and held in the City Hall Court to await the result of his son's injuries. Several men, one a brother of the victim, will likely be arraigned as witnesses."

The police information which was learned is that the shooting was not intentional. Two shots had been fired to frighten the aggressive son away and the third accidentally struck Clarence on the left side, puncturing the lungs. The son, before his death, exonerated the father from any deliberate, premeditated shooting. The father is being held in the County Prison to await the outcome of the Coroner's hearing, which will be held tomorrow.

Of course, it must be understood, the mind cannot do everything, but can help.

The so-called Spanish influenza, which has been raging in Europe and now has arrived on our shores, is nothing in the world but our old and familiar enemy, the "grip."

This, however, needs a bit of explaining.

Apparently the grip germ (like that of bubonic plague) has its original home somewhere in the Far East—perhaps in China. Once in every few years an epidemic of the malady starts from that part of the world, crosses Asia and Europe, and spreads over our own continent.

It kills a whole lot of people—at first, that is. Afterward it gradually dies down, with relatively few fatalities among those attacked. It becomes more or less localized in scattered districts, where it starts up from time to time.

We are never altogether free from grip. It makes a good deal of sickness in any year. But it is the fresh invasion that is really malignant.

We had such an invasion in 1890. It came by way of Turkey, and it accomplished much destruction of human life before and after it touched our shores.

We had had twenty-two previous recorded epidemics of the disease, nation-wide, the first that we know about being in 1647. But in Europe the history of the malady goes back to the middle ages, and doubtless it achieved many prehistoric devastations.

The germ has been identified—a very tiny rod-shaped organism. There is good reason for believing that it is distributed mainly by the air. But there are other means for its conveyance. During epidemics postoffice clerks and bank clerks (the latter handling much soiled paper money) are attacked in large numbers.

Adults are more liable to grip than children. Another odd fact is that an attack, instead of producing a relative immunity (as is usually the case with germ diseases), predisposes the victim to further attacks. He becomes more liable to the complaint.

The first thing to do is to go right to bed and stay there. To try to "fight off" the grip while going about one's business is a bad mistake. Such an attempt is likely to result in the death of the sufferer; for pneumonia and gastro-intestinal disorders are always to be feared as complications.

ALL FOUND UNCONSCIOUS

An automobile, traveling at a high rate of speed, crashed into a tree and overturned after skidding from the Seashore Boulevard between Oceanview and Clermont early on Monday, causing the death of Francis Hickey, 25, of 3648 Stanton street, East Falls, and serious injury of four others.

As all of the victims were unconscious when discovered, it was not possible to learn the identity of the dead man until attaches of the Cadman Morgue, where the body was taken, found a letter in his pocket addressed to his mother, Mrs. Daniel Hickey, who lives at 35 Gorman avenue, Collingswood, N. J.

Corporal Mury and Trooper Riley of the State police barracks at Tuckahoe, who, together with County detective Higbee, investigated the accident, said that at first they believed the crash was caused by a hit-and-run driver, who side-swiped another machine. For a short time they worked on that theory.

Further investigation, however, led to the conclusion that the machine skidded along the wet road for some distance before leaving the highway. By checking up on the tire tread, found leading from a distance of 150 feet in front of the tree itself, it was shown almost positively that their second surmise was correct.

Conaghy, though seriously injured, was questioned by the investigators, but said nothing more than the occupants of the car had spent the week-end in Wildwood and at the time of the fatality were on their return to Atlantic City.

AGED RESIDENT BURIED TUESDAY

WAS WIDELY RESPECTED

With the death of Benjamin F. Calverley, Sr., father of the prominent Ridge avenue realtor, Roxborough loses another of its prominent citizens of the generation. WAS OLDEST RESIDENT

Mrs. Mary Jane Porter, Dead at
the Age of 95 Years, Lived
Here 80 Years

INTERESTING RECORD

Mrs. Mary Jane Porter, 95 years old, of 3642 Midvale avenue, who died on Monday, was the oldest resident of East Falls.

Mrs. Porter was born in Ireland, on August 14, 1830, close to the Giant's Causeway, and at the age of 15 she came to this country and lived in a house which stood on ground which is now a part of Central Laurel Hill Cemetery.

Five or six years after settling in the Falls, Mrs. Porter married Wil-

Ham Cowan and two weeks after this union, Mr. Cowan suffered a severe accident in the laboratory of Powers & Weighman, which forced him to use a cane and is believed to have been the indirect cause of his death.

Two Cowans lived for many years on a farm on Ridge avenue, opposite the Falls Presbyterian Church, and Mrs. Porter was often heard to tell of how she served milk to the soldiers of the Civil War when they were camped on the recruiting ground, now occupied by the Queen lane pumping station.

The marriage was blest with five children, James, Anna, Fanny, Mary and Rebecca.

William Cowan was a charter member of Falls Presbyterian Church, and his wife also became affiliated with the new religious organization.

Some time after the death of Mr. Cowan, his widow married John Porter, who had long been acquainted with the Cowans. Mr. Porter served meritoriously in the Union Army, during the War of the Rebellion.

John Porter was a widower, and Josephine Porter—who later became Mrs. Edward Singer—John Porter, Jr., and another daughter Margaret—who died when about 15 years old—were children of his first marriage.

William Porter is a son of the second marriage of the couple.

Fifty-three years ago Mrs. Porter moved to the Midvale avenue address when the locality was known as Dutch Hollow. She was always of an active nature and was ever ready to extend a helping hand to any who were in need.

In 1912 Mrs. Porter, being greatly interested in the teachings of Abdul Baha, noted Persian educator, felt greatly honored when he was at a reception in the late Dr. Conwell's Baptist Temple, and, becoming tired in shaking the hands of those present, waited especially before departing to greet Mrs. Porter, who was at that time 82 years old.

In 1923 Mrs. Porter sat for a photograph of herself, a daughter, a granddaughter and a great-granddaughter, all of whom had been christened Mary. In that year the aged lady attended the Presbyterian Sunday school picnic and also made a trip to Glenolden to visit a granddaughter.

Mrs. Porter is survived by one son, three daughters—one other, Mrs. Fannie Morrison, died only ten days ago—fifteen grandchildren and twenty-two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held today in Falls Presbyterian Church and the burial will take place at Mount Vernon Cemetery.

EAST FALLS MAN BURNED TO DEATH

When fire broke out in the bake-room of Charles Wernert, Frederick and Eveline streets, at 3.00 A. M., last Wednesday morning the proprietor was trapped in the flames and perished.

The fire is believed to have started when a pot of doughnut grease, spilled over and set fire to the cellar stairs. Wernert, who was supervising his baking, realized the danger of his sleeping family, upstairs and apparently attempted to get up the steps, but these collapsed and buried him underneath, where he received the horrible burns which caused his death.

His body was not recovered until the firemen had searched the ruins, after the fire was under control.

The bakery was located in a two-story structure, at the intersection of two of East Falls steepest streets. On account of the grades of these thoroughfares the firemen were retarded in reaching the conflagration, experiencing the utmost difficulty in getting their apparatus to the blazing building.

Emil Wernert, the 12 year old son of the dead baker, was the most seriously injured of those who escaped. The lad was asleep when the fire started and upon awaking found his bedroom filled with smoke and

flames. He started to make his way to the stairway, but was cut off by the flames and was forced to jump from a second story window.

Cornelius McHenry and William Gotwals, who had been dining in the Gun Boat Cafe, around the corner, arrived on the scene in advance of the firemen and rendered heroic service in aiding the other members of the family to escape.

Horace Knipe, a policeman attached to the 14th District, at Hunting Park avenue and 22nd street, while patrolling his beat along Midvale avenue heard the screams of Mrs. Anna Wernert, the baker's wife, as she leaned from the front bedroom window. Knipe summoned Engine Company No. 5, on Ridge avenue at the foot of Eveline street.

Within five minutes after the fire was discovered several thrilling rescues were made. Caroline Wernert, 25 years old, a daughter, was heard screaming at a rear bedroom window. It was impossible for the rescuers to aid Miss Wernert, whereupon they ordered her to jump, and standing with outstretched arms, the policeman, with McHenry and Gotwals, and two other spectators, broke the force of her fall.

The mother who had been trapped in the front of the house was almost given up for lost when Lieutenant Leo Prodoehl, was seen to emerge with Mrs. Wernert lying across his shoulders, unconscious. Mrs. Wernert and her family found refuge in the home of Park Guard "Dan" Furman, who won the Fairmount Park hero award on several occasions, several occasions.

The son, Emil was hurried to the Memorial Hospital where he lay unconscious for several hours. The physicians at that institution report that he is slowly recovering.

THOUSANDS PAY LAST HONOR TO DEAD PHYSICIAN

Death of Clarence K. Dengler Considered a Community Calamity

Honored in death as well as in life, Dr. Clarence K. Dengler, who passed away at the Memorial Hospital, at 12.35 last Saturday morning, was laid to rest in West Laurel Hill Cemetery, at 1 o'clock on Monday. The esteem with which this beloved physician was held all over the East, as well as locally, was expressed by the thousands who paid homage to his memory while his body was lying in state, and who attended the funeral services, which were held in his former residence. There was hardly a large city or medical organization in the East that was not represented by some individual who paid tribute to Dr. Dengler's fame.

As a token of respect, as well as a measure of necessity, Lt. Taylor and his Thirteenth District police diverted traffic from Ridge avenue, in Wissahickon, in order that the funeral procession might not be impeded. This respect was also shown Dr. Dengler on Sunday, while his body was lying in state. From 2.30 o'clock until late at night and again on Monday, a steady stream of mourners passed by the coffin and viewed the body. During this period also, Lt. Taylor diverted traffic and stationed patrolmen to watch over the neighborhood.

The death of Dr. Dengler has been described as nothing short of a com-

munity calamity and groups of people along the streets and in the homes could be heard discussing it to the exclusion of all else.

Dr. Dengler, who was a noted dermatologist, whose skill in treatment of skin diseases has brought patients from all parts of the country, died from septic poisoning resulting from an infection which started in a small scratch on his arm. He had battled for more than eleven days with the poison at Memorial Hospital, where he was a member of the staff and where he served internship.

On Tuesday more than a score of friends of the famous physician offered their blood when a call was issued and preparations made for transfusion. The doctor was so weak, however, that the transfusion was impossible. Death usually results in a short time from an infection such as he suffered, but Dr. Dengler fought since Wednesday a week ago against the slowly spreading poison. He was unconscious for several days before succumbing.

A small scratch on his left arm became infected three days before he went to the hospital. The infection cleared up, but on Wednesday the condition became noticeable again and Dr. Dengler went to the hospital. From that time his condition grew steadily worse.

Dr. Dengler graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1898. He was a member of the football team there, playing end, and was a member of the first football team of Pottsville High School, and for several years coached the team of Roxborough High School. On the day he went to the hospital, Dr. Dengler was to address teammates of the Pottsville school in that town, where he was born.

For seventeen years he served as professor of dermatology at the University of Pennsylvania, where he studied under Dr. Hartzell, probably the greatest dermatologist in the world, and later was head of that department at the Woman's Medical College. He resigned from the post some time ago, when his practice increased as his fame spread through the country. Dr. Dengler made several trips through the State, lecturing on skin diseases.

He maintained offices both at Twentieth and Chestnut streets and at 5201 Ridge avenue, in Wissahickon.

DIED YESTERDAY**

Lieutenant James Riggs, for thirty-three years a member of Engine Company 39, passed quietly away at his home, 359 Conarroe street at two minutes of six o'clock yesterday morning. Lieutenant Riggs, who was in his seventy-first year is survived by a widow, Josephine, and seven sons, Joseph, George, James, William, Walter, Marshall and John. The funeral will take place at 2.30 P. M. on Friday from his late residence. The interment will be in the Leverington cemetery.

Lieutenant Riggs was appointed to the Fire Department on January 9, 1892, and went on duty on February 1, of that year. He was retired on February 1, 1925, making his term of service exactly thirty-three years. Six months after he had joined the fire company he was made Assistant Foreman, as it was then termed, a position corresponding to the present lieutenant. On April 11, 1894, when the rank of lieutenant was created, he received that ranking. He therefore never had a senior, in point of service, with the same rank.

"I left the service," he said recently, "without having made a single enemy and that is something for a man who has served as long as I have to say."

Captain Campbell, who was his old chief, is unstinted in according Lieutenant Riggs the highest possible praise. He said yesterday in an interview, "I have never worked with a better man in all my life than Lieutenant Riggs. Nothing I ever asked him to do was too much. He

never shirked or hesitated at a task in his life."

Lieutenant Riggs was injured several times in the course of his career. The worst of these was in June, 1918, when he answered a fire call at Rex and Ridge avenues. Upon arriving upon the scene an automobile truck was found in flames, and while fighting the fire the fuel tank exploded showering him with flaming gasoline. He was horribly burned from head to foot, his hands suffering the worst, and it was three months before he was out of the hospital and back on duty again.

Lieutenant Riggs used his spare time around the firehouse in carpentry work and wood carving, making many useful and ornamental things for his home.

Massa was a well-known professional football player. He was an employee of the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Duff C. Law Killed When Plane Crashes

Roxborough Inventor Victim
of Strange Mishap at
Indianapolis

FATHER OF FIVE

Was Son of James D. Law,
A Writer of Interna-
tional Repute

Christmas lost all of its happiness for the family of Duff C. Law, of 447 Harmon Road, Roxborough, when word was received late on Sunday evening of his sudden death in an airplane crash at Indianapolis.

Mr. Law had been in Hollywood as special technician in connection with the sound picture experiments being made by the Warner Brothers Company there.

Son of James D. Law, famous as the "Scotch-American poet," who died last year, Duff C. Law has long been noted as an expert on talking pictures and color photography.

Those things were the hobbies of the elder Law. As long as 20 years ago the elder Law, who was a close friend of Walt Whitman, demonstrated a talking picture apparatus.

For several years the father was a member of the board of trustees of the Walt Whitman Memorial Commission in Camden, which established Whitman's old home on Mickle street, Camden, as a shrine.

The Harmon Road man, 42, was engaged by Warner Brothers some time ago to direct their research department and to organize a laboratory for them in Brooklyn.

He is survived by his wife and five children: Norman, 18; Kenneth, 16; Lorna, 15; Jeanette, 11, and Gordon, 4.

Until a few months ago he was associated with Dr. Isadore Kitsee, and analytical chemist whose laboratory is at 315 Willings alley, under the classification of "Inventors." It is understood that they were working jointly towards a new system of color photography. Their joint offices were at 105 North Fifth street.

Law was a member of the Photographic Society of America.

The plane, bound from St. Louis to Columbus, O., was more than a half hour behind schedule and the pilot, D. W. Burford, planned to land at Indianapolis for the night because of a heavy snowfall, which, coupled with the darkening skies, made further travel dangerous.

The ship left St. Louis an hour late and gained time in the trip to Indianapolis. When it arrived at the field at 5.05 o'clock it circled the field in a snowstorm, which had just begun to cloud the atmosphere.

Circling the airport, Burford chose to land on the south and set the ship down slightly past the middle

of the port, according to H. Wier Cook, general manager of the Curtiss-Wright Flying Service, who was in the Curtiss offices at that time. The pilot slightly misjudged the speed of the ship, it was thought, and that fact, added to the icy condition of the field, caused the huge plane to coast to the extreme south end of the landing area.

The stump which the plane struck was approximately five feet in height, and had been left standing when the trees were removed from the south section more than a year ago. The plane hit the stump almost squarely and the impact ripped through the fuselage, breaking the left longeron, a main piece of the frame work.

Law, sitting on the left side of the ship, was injured in the first crash of fuselage against the stump. The left landing gear strut supporting the wheel also was torn off, allowing the wheel to drop. The ship then skidded sideways and came to a stop.

Visibility was estimated at a mile by the pilot and co-pilot. Passengers of the ship also said that the landing lights of the field were plainly visible.

The crash released landing flares at the tail of the plane, and the sudden illumination caused many persons to believe the ship had caught fire.

Law and two other passengers each fell partly out of the plane and were dragged along the ground as the ship taxied north from the south end of the field.

Medical attention to the injured was given by Dr. A. W. Hadley, of Maywood, and his son, Wilbur Hadley, an officer in the medical corps of the United States Army, at Fort

Hayes, Columbus, O., who is home on leave. The pilot, Burford, 28, is a native of Mt. Clemens, Mich., and had been employed by the T. A. T. two years. He formerly piloted a private mail plane for the Ford Motor Car Company between Chicago and Detroit, Mich. Both he and H. S. Zimmerman, 28, co-pilot, now live at Columbus.

The eight other passengers on the ship were uninjured except for slight shock, and were cared for at the T. A. T. office, at Mars Hill.

The official statement given out by Henry W. Conner, Eastern traffic manager of the T. A. T., was:

"The accident was caused as follows:

"An eastbound plane landed at Indianapolis in the midst of a blinding snowstorm after circling the field twice. There was practically no wind blowing as the plane circled the field. But as it touched the ground, a sudden sharp blast from the north was on the tail of the plane, driving it through the boundary across the road into rough ground.

"The plane cut off a stump with the left landing gear and wheel. A strut was driven through the fuselage and killed Law and injured two others."

Mr. Law will be buried from the Stetler Funeral Home, Ridge avenue and Martin street, on Friday afternoon. The interment is to be private.

The Twenty-first Ward suffered a tremendous loss on Friday, when death claimed J. Edward B. Twells, at his home, 600 Leverington avenue, Roxborough.

Mr. Twells was one of the section's pioneer bus operators, having started in the business before the era of the motor driven coach, some thirty-five years ago. His first venture was in operating horse-drawn busses up and down the Wissahickon Creek Drive, and to West Laurel Hill Cemetery. When the automobile came into existence he was the first in the northwest part of Philadelphia to adapt the mechanical means for transporting passengers. His keen business sense and determination brought him to the top rank in his profession, and his large fleet of de luxe cars have traveled all over the Atlantic coast.

"Eddie" Twells, as he was familiarly called by thousands, was born at 323 W. Penn street, Brooklyn, N. Y., on March 18th, 1871, the son of George and Mary E. Twells. His father having died while he was a young lad, Twells at the age of seven, with his mother and two sisters, who still survive, came to Philadelphia, where he has since lived continuously in Wissahickon and Roxborough.

On July 13th, 1892 Twells was married to Miss Ida Lebengood, of Roxborough. The union was blessed with two children, a son, Bray, who died in infancy, and a daughter, who is now Mrs. Charles Sowden, the wife of a former U. S. Naval officer, at present a merchant marine port director, of Philadelphia.

Mr. Twells, who was loved for his quietly genial disposition, once found his greatest diversion in owning and training fast horses for the race track. Three of the best known animals which he owned were "Coal Black Lady," "General Annie," and "Peaches." These horses were often taken to the track at Belmont where by their performances they added to their owner's long list of friends.

The deceased, in addition to being vice president of the Philadelphia Bus Operator's Association, was a director of the Wissahickon Business Men's Association, and a member of several fraternal organizations, including Richard Vaux Lodge, No. 384, F. and A. M. and of the P. O. S. of A.

Stricken Two Weeks Ago in Office; Second Attack in Home Proves Fatal.

KIN AT HIS BEDSIDE

Charles J. Webb, president of the firm of Charles J. Webb & Co., 116 Chestnut street, an internationally known wool merchant, died suddenly at his home in Elkins Park last night.

Webb, who was 71, suffered a stroke of paralysis two weeks ago yesterday while at his office. He was taken to his home, and no word of his illness became public. He had been confined to his bed since that time. Death was due to a second stroke.

The three sons of the merchant, who was a widower, were at his bedside. They are: Andrew S., B. Edwin and Herbert K. Webb. He was attended by Drs. David Riesman and Charles O. W. Bartine.

"Boss" Webb, as his employees affectionately called him, and "Charley" Webb, as he was known to his host of friends, died a very wealthy man—but he was always proud to call himself "self-made."

He had a towering, broad figure, dominated by a jovial face with a goatee that made him conspicuous at meetings of the Union League, the Manufacturers' Club, the Rotary Club and the dozen or so other organizations of which he was a member.

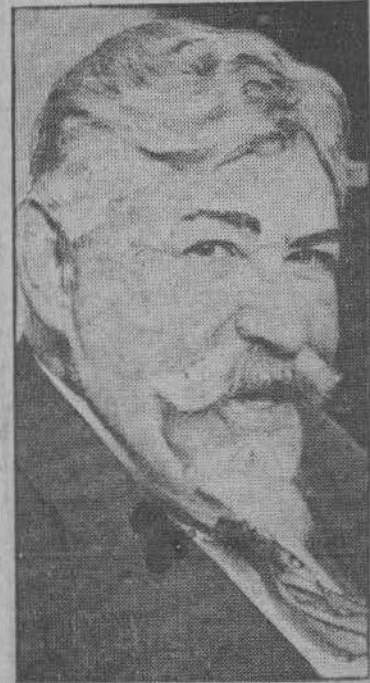
He was president of the Philadelphia Textile Manufacturers' Association, vice president of the National Association of Manufacturers, vice president of the Manufacturers' Club and a director of the Union League for the last seven years.

He also was a director in several banks and industrial organizations.

"Boss" Webb was born in 1858 in Burlington, N. J., the son of poor parents. At the age of 8 he went to work sodding lawns, running errands, picking wild arbutus for Burlington dinner tables and otherwise making himself useful.

Before he was 13, he had a job in a

grocery store at \$2.50 a week. At 16 he was earning \$10 a week.

Then came the great moment of his life, "the most courageous step I ever took," as Webb himself expressed it. He gave up a \$10 job for one paying \$6.50 with a wool firm in Philadelphia. He gave up his old job because the new promised advancement.

It proved to be such an advancement that during the war the poor little boy of Burlington had grown into a wealthy Philadelphian who was able to buy \$11,000,000 worth of Liberty Bonds.

Internationally Known.

In 1882 Webb married Mary Kate Spangler, a Colonial Dame and a Daughter of the American Revolution. He had risen to a commanding position in the business world even then, but in 1884 he founded the wool house bearing his name, and that was destined to send his name into every port in the world where wool was to be bought.

The firm of Charles J. Webb & Co. was known not only nationally, but internationally, and it was conceded to be one of the largest wool houses in the world. Many years ago, when the Government held wool auction sales, he bought the greatest amount of any individual, incidentally raising the price for the Government.

Webb was chairman of the advisory board of the Salvation Army, and has contributed heavily to many charities, as well as schools and colleges, whose advantages he never seemed to miss.

He liked all outdoor sports, particularly golf, and was a member of the Whitemarsh Country Club. He attended St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church, in Ogontz.

Falls Man Slain By Stepson

Neil Mulligan Killed on Sunday Morning in Kensington

SEPARATED FROM WIFE

Pronounced Dead When Taken to Episcopal Hospital

"Neil" Mulligan, well known in East Falls, where he lived most of his life, was shot and killed by his 17-year-old stepson, Edward Slickmeyer, early on Sunday morning, when the man called at an apartment, at 2950 Frankford avenue, where the boy and his two sisters were sleeping.

The boy's mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Mulligan, 38, was at Gratersford, visiting friends, at the time. Edward is the child of her first marriage, as are Ruth Slickmeyer, 16, and Ethel, 14. A fourth child, William Mulligan, 6, was with his mother.

Mrs. Mulligan and her second husband had been separated for some time.

The apartment where the Slickmeyer's lived is on the third floor.

At 4:30 a. m., Sunday, Mulligan entered the side door downstairs, police say. He made his way to the third floor apartment, and forced the door there.

Ruth and Ethel awoke, and seeing their stepfather, screamed.

Edward leaped out of bed just as his stepfather came into the room.

His stepfather came at him, as if to strike him, the boy told police, and forced him against the wall.

Alongside the boy was a bureau in which was a .32 caliber automatic pistol. The boy flung open the drawer and seized the pistol.

As the stepfather came closer, the boy aimed the pistol at him.

"I wanted only to scare him," the boy told police later. "As he came very close, I pulled the trigger."

Five shots poured from the automatic.

Every one struck the stepfather in the chest. He crumpled to the floor.

Screams of the girls and the sound of the shots awakened John Ritchie, who owns the apartment house and lives on the first floor.

He came running to the scene. Seeing what had happened, he ran outside and halted Stanley Morton, 4752 Vista street, a motorist. Morton took Mulligan to the Episcopal Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

Death Claims Jacob Swartz

Former Railway Official Passes Away From Infirmities of Age, at His West Philadelphia Home. — Spent Childhood in East Falls.

It was with feelings of sorrow that the many Falls of Schuylkill friends of Jacob K. Swartz, of 4424 Sansom street, learned of his death, which occurred from the infirmities of age at 1:30 A. M. on Wednesday of last week.

Born in Lawrenceville—now Parkersford, Pennsylvania—in 1843, Mr. Swartz was in his 82nd year. With his parents and family he moved to the Falls of Schuylkill in 1854. The Swartzs first moved into a house on the old Mifflin estate, owned by Robert Evans, on what is now Stanton street. They dwelt there for a short period and then moved to Laboratory lane, and later to a home on Ridge avenue, in front of Grace Reformed Church. Finally the family moved to the house now occupied by John Hohenadel, of Indian Queen lan, which had been erected by Charles

F. Abbott.

His father, Christian Swartz, was the master mason for the Reading Railroad Company, and while serving in that capacity erected the first skew stone bridge in the world. The structure, which inaugurated the use of a new principle in masonry construction, still carries the Reading tracks across the Schuylkill river at the Falls. The elder Mr. Swartz was subsequently killed in a railroad accident near Pottstown, Pa., on August 26th 1858, five years after bringing his family to the Falls of Schuylkill.

After his marriage to Miss Janet G. Long, Jacob Swartz lived for many years in a house on the old Falls road, adjacent to the Philadelphia Country Club grounds. After the Swartzs' moved from this house it became the residence of a Fairmount Park employee, named Klister.

The deceased found his vocation in the railroad business and served the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for many years at its waterfront terminals in New York City. He afterward became the treasurer of the Washington, Alexandria and Mount Vernon Railway, now familiar to visitors to the National Capitol as "the Washington and Virginia." This high-speed electric line traverses the territory between the city of Washington and Mount Vernon, America's shrine, as the home of its first president.

Mr. Swartz acted as treasurer of this company for twenty-eight years, until poor circulation affected his eyes and after unavailing efforts to remedy the trouble, he became totally blind. Undaunted by this sad affliction, he mastered the Braille system of touch reading and during his enforced retirement passed many hours in reading books set in raised characters.

He attended every service connected with the building and dedication of the Christian and Baza Swartz Church School, of the Falls of Schuylkill Baptist Church, which was erected last year by his brother, James S. Swartz, as a memorial to their parents. At the cornerstone laying, on July 21st, last, Jacob K. Swartz participated in that ceremony by laying a copy of the Scriptures in the cavity of the stone.

The deceased is survived by his wife; one brother, James S. Swartz, LL.D., who is president of the Board of Trustees of Bucknell University; and one grandson, Conrad Mills. He was a member of Palestine Lodge No. 470 F. and A. M., and of the Falls of Schuylkill Baptist Church, where funeral services were held on Friday afternoon. The interment was made in West Laurel Hill Cemetery.
