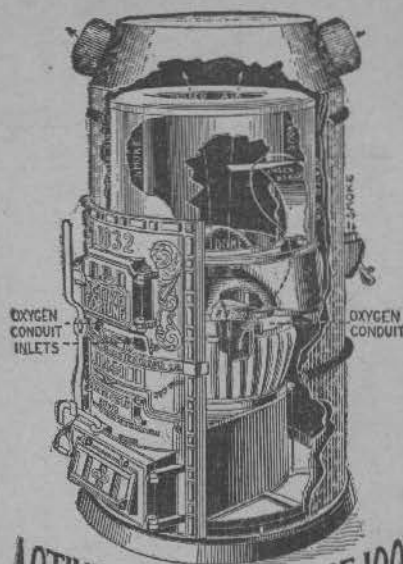

### THE CROOK

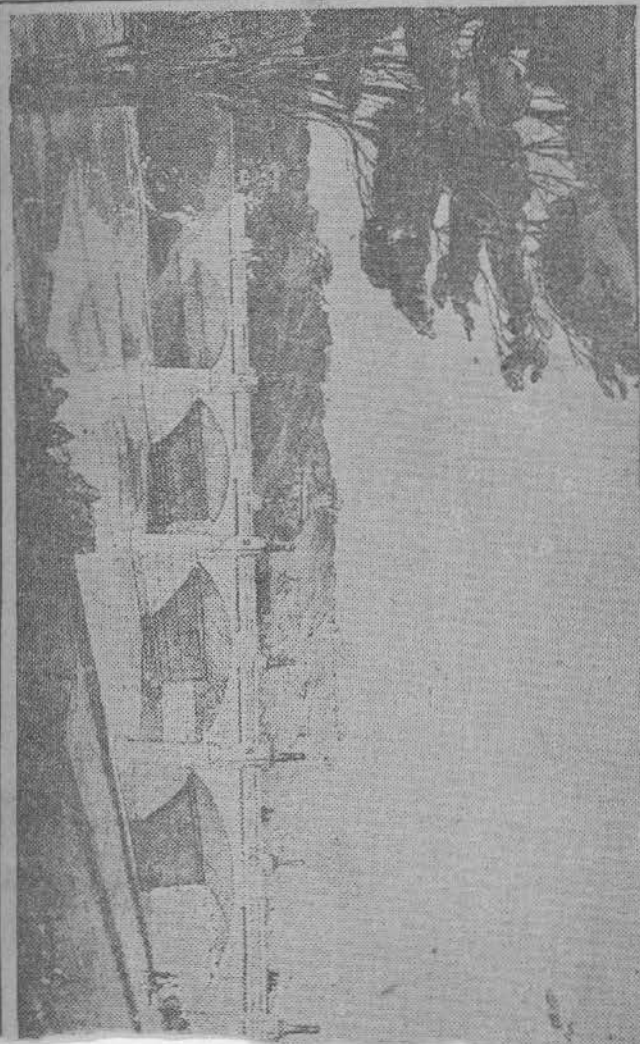
If you build a carpet factory,
