Dear Sir:

There was recently a traffic collision of two large trucks at the intersection of Queen Lane and Henry Avenue. Warning signs had been erected here and removed, which was very puzzling, so I immediately called the matter to the attention of Robert A. Mitchell, Traffic Engineer, who has written me as follows in reference thereto:

"In reference to your letter of December 18th, about the collision at the intersection of Queen Lane and Henry Avenue, I am sorry to advise you that the removal of signs at this intersection might have had a great deal to do with the cause of this collision. Unfortunately, we have no jurisdiction over how the Bureau of Highways handles the maintenance of traffic signs.

There has been a W.P.A. project going on for some-time under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Highways for cleaning and re-painting the various types of traffic signs. When this project was started, we suggested to the Bureau of Highways that various signs of a temporary nature be made up--so that they could be erected in the place of a sign which was being taken down for repairs. Further developments have shown, however, that they did not accept this suggestion, and whenever they wish to fix or repair a sign, they dismantle the same and leave the corner unprotected. It is my understanding that this was the reason the signs were not erected at the above noted intersection when the accident

occurred."

About the only comment that one can make in reference to this is that the W.P.A. projects, of course, are very much to be commended for keeping their unemployed at work, but it is a perfect illustration of how two agencies, when their lines cross, may temporarily interfere with very good intentions. While the cleaning and repairing of the traffic signs is commendable, it seems to have taken a great deal of time to do this, and meantime we had this very unfortunate collision, which attracted a great deal of attention.





We are enclosing Information Sheets prepared by the Women's, Education, and Library Divisions of the United States Constitution Sesquicentennial Commission which give the "Essential Features" pertaining to this far-reaching celebration honoring the Constitution. The general plans will be carried throughout the celebration with some variations and additions. This material is sent at the suggestion of Mrs. Chester D. Swope.

The United States Constitution Sesquicentennial Commission was created by an Act of Congress in 1935 to plan and direct the activities for the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the formation of the Constitution of the United States. This observance will be historical and educational in character, and nation-wide in scope. It is to cover a period of nineteen months, beginning September 17, 1937 and terminating April 30, 1939, the 150th anniversary of the inauguration of General Washington as President of this Republic. The time of the celebration corresponds to the periods of the Ratification contests and the organization of the National Government. Through channels of every activity we hope to develop a comprehensive understanding of the character and purpose of this historical commemoration.

This Commission is inviting all schools, libraries, and organized groups of men and women to cooperate in this significant observance. This time prior to the official opening of the celebration is one of research, preparation, and organization. At a later date there will be educational pamphlets, pictures, and charts for distribution.

We know that all women's groups, as well as each individual, will have a definite part in this observance and we shall be grateful for your assistance in developing the proper attitude toward this commemoration. Early plans assure the success of any movement, and whatever service you may render will be appreciated.

Mrs. Richard Harding Davis, widow of the famous novelist and war correspondent, known on the stage as Bessie McCoy, died Sunday night at a hospital in France.

Her daughter Hope, who is in her teens, and Miss Louise Frey, her nurse and companion, were with her.

Mrs. Davis, known to thousands as the "Yama Yama Girl" a quarter of a century ago, had been summering with her daughter at St. Jean de Luz. A few days ago she was taken ill and hurried to Bayonne for treatment and hurried clinic operated by Dr. de Lay.

The body is to be taken to Paris for cremation. The ashes will be sent to the United States, probably to her Westchester county (N. Y.) home where her husband died fifteen years ago, or possibly to Leverington cemetery, in Roxborough, where her husband's ashes repose.

Mrs. Davis' husband was born in Philadelphia April 13, 1864 and died April 11, 1916. He was a son of L. Clark Davis, for years editor of the Public Ledger, and Rebecca Harding, a popular writer of her day.

Mr. Davis attended Lehigh University and Johns Hopkins, but did not graduate from either.

quitting college early in the for newspaper work.

Bessie McCoy was Mr. Davis' second wife, his first, divorced, having been Cecil Clark, the daughter of a Chicago manufacturer.

Although the Davis estate had dwindled to \$56,000 at his death, the royalties from his many works sent it upward again, and recently it was appraised at \$136,181.

His widow was one of the great favorites of the light opera stage, and was born Elizabeth McCoy.

She played with Weber and Fields as the "Yama Yama Girl."

In 1912 she was married to Mr. Davis, then in the heyday of his career. The only celebration of the wedding day was an outing to a resort near New York with 500 East Side children and their mothers, a picnic which Mr. Davis had arranged with a charitable organization.

After a period of married life, Bessie McCoy expressed a yearning for the stage, in defiance of her husband's wishes.

After his death in 1916 she appeared for several years in dancing acts. For a time, in 1920, she appeared in the Shubert "Midnight Whirl."

In January, 1922, Miss McCoy appeared at the Chestnut Street Opera House as the headliner of a Shubert vaudeville bill. Her vehicle was a dancing sketch, "Castles in the Air," which gave her opportunities for many changes in costume.



Dear Sir:

A friend noticed the article concerning the new gasoline station at Ridge Avenue and Calumet Street entrance to the Falls of the Schuylkill Bridge which appeared in "The Suburban Press" September 16, 1937, and sent to me a copy of same. She knew that I had been doing quite a bit of research on the Shronk family. My little grand daughter is a descendant of George Shronk through his son Godfrey, Godfrey being the one who had "The Fishery" on the Schuylkill River near this bridge.

I will give her line, George and wife Catherine, Godfrey and wife Elizabeth, John and wife Christiana, Christiana G. Shronk and husband Armer Robinson, Elizabeth Robinson and husband John Dearie, Margaret Dearie and husband A. D. Harrison, Wm. H. Harrison and wife Carolyn Quarles, their daughter being Carolyn E. Harrison.

I had made a short history of my childrens ancestors back to eight ancestors who were in the Rev. War in Virginia and South Carolina. This little girls mother passed on when she was not quite two years old and I am raising her. I decided some two years ago to trace back on her fathers side and make this record for her. This is why I became interested in the Shronk family.

I drove over to the office of your paper yesterday and the young lady there gave me your address. I wanted to get in touch with the elderly gentleman who gave to you the published Shronk data. I thought that he might be able to tell me more about these folks. I am asking you to please put me in touch with him or anyone else whom you think could and would supply me with more data. I have been told that a Mr. Robert R. Shronk, who passed on several years ago, wrote an article about the Shronk family and it was published in some newspaper but they do not seem to know the name of the paper or the date of publication.

George Shronk paid taxes as early as 1769 but I do not know just where this land was located. Godfrey did not inherit his land at Falls of Shuylkill from his father, whose will was proved 1804 and left only some money to Godfrey. I have been trying to find out just when Godfrey acquired his land, spoken of above.

I am also trying to find out just where "Hood Cemetery" w was located in 1827. Godfrey said to be buried there, although his death was recorded in the records of St. Michael Evan. Congregation, on Germantown Ave.

Any assistance that you can render me in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

I have been told that Mr. Robert Roberts Shronk wrote quite an article on the Shronk Family, but no one seems to know when or which paper it was published in.

I possibly did not mention that I was more interested in finding some interesting data on Godfrey Shronk and various members of his family than genealogical records. I wanted to incorporate them in the family records. I seem to know more about the family genealogically than do the descendants. I have copies of the will of his father George Shronk, also of the will of Godfrey, will of Daniel and of others. I have visited the City Hall for wills and deeds and for tax records. I have trampled down the weeds in search of tombstone records.
